

Presenter: Walt Pomeroy Thursday, April 17th at 7:30 pm (for directions to meeting location, see page 2)

Combining pictures and stories from four different trips, Walt Pomeroy will take us on a quick historic and naturalist tour of Iceland, the world's oldest democracy. It is the land of seabirds, windswept open vistas and geothermal hot water.

The Atlantic island Canadian provinces of Newfoundland, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will be seen from the perspective of the water as you begin to travel south. These coasts are rich in bird life and historic settings. A visit to a nearby piece of France still remaining in the "New World" will also be included.

Then buckle your seatbelt and travel to the southern Atlantic Ocean and to the bird-rich Falkland Islands and South Georgia Island. You will be amazed; extreme winds and moderate temperatures part of the year have created a habitat rich with millions of birds, including almost half of the world's penguins.

Last, Walt will share with us in pictures and words his visit in March 2008 to the most remote inhabited island in the world. Tristan da Cunha is a British Oversees Protectorate Island halfway between nowhere and somewhere in the south Atlantic. Actually, it is a volcanic island about half-way between Cape Horn and the Cape of Good Hope and home to about 300 people and countless migrating seabirds.

Walt Pomeroy is the retired National Audubon Mid-Atlantic Regional Vice President. While working in the Mid-Atlantic states for 17 years he charted over 20 new Audubon chapters and organized over a dozen regional and national Audubon conferences. He started the first state Important Bird Areas program in the US (Pennsylvania) and helped to establish the Pennsylvania Audubon state office.

Protect Birds at the Feeder

Did you know that, according to a 1992 study conducted by the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology, predation, predominately by household cats, caused 36 percent of bird deaths? You can help prevent this by placing bird feeders in locations that do not provide hiding places for these predators. Birdfeeders should be placed 5 to 12 feet from low shrubs or bushes that provide cover for hungry cats.

Waggoner's Gap Fundraiser Reminder



This is a reminder about the AAS annual appeal that arrived in the mail the second week of March. We are hoping to raise \$5,000 from member donations that would be matched by chapter funds, making a total \$10,000. These funds will be used entirely toward the purchase of an important piece of land next to the Waggoner's Gap Hawk Watch on the Kittatinny Ridge (known locally as Blue or North Mountain).

Why are we so excited about this project?



- Waggoner's Gap is known for the Audubon-owned Hawk Watch, where volunteers have been counting the annual fall raptor migration for more than 50 years. It's also where many Appalachian Audubon members have spent countless hours educating visitors and doing trail work to make it an outstanding resource for the public.
- Waggoner's Gap is located "down ridge" from Hawk Mountain Sanctuary; and due to several ridges joining at the Susquehanna River, more eagles and hawks end up flying past "the Gap" than at Hawk Mountain. *Last year, 539 eagles and more than 26,000 total raptors were counted passing by Waggoner's Gap during their migration along the ridge.*
- This property is adjacent to the Reineman Sanctuary in Perry County and the Audubon Hawk Watch on the top of the Ridge, <u>so buying it will prevent homes from being built next</u> to the Hawk Watch and will create an even larger block of protected ridge-top habitat!

AAS Hosts ZooAmerica at Cleve J. Fredricksen Library

Our chapter tried something new this year. In an attempt to reach out to families and children of all ages, on March 2nd we invited the community to a free program about Endangered Species, (presented by ZooAmerica) which included some very interesting live creatures. We chose a Sunday afternoon during the chilly, sometimes boring part of winter, hoping that there would be interest, while avoiding conflicts with sports activities and other social events. It worked! About 100 participants of every age came out that day to meet a burrowing owl, an alligator (to talk about disappearing crocodiles), an American Kestrel, a gopher tortoise, and an indigo snake. Human activity and loss of habitat is the main reason for these creatures becoming endangered. Our speaker, Mike Kerr, also brought a de-scented striped skunk, to make the point that some animals adapt easily to human activity. Tasty refreshments topped off the day. Everyone had a great time and learned a lot. We send a big thank you to Mike and Hershey ZooAmerica. Thanks also to Susan Miller, who arranged the event, and Sue Strassner, Kathy Kuchwara, Paul Zeph, Tom Lehman, and Lorrie Preston who gave up several hours on a Sunday afternoon for our chapter. We all came away feeling pleased about the success of the event.
