Goddard Leadership Camp Scholarships for Teens, July 12–17, 2015


The Goddard Leadership Legacy Institute is a week-long residential environmental leadership program for youths aged 13-15. It is coordinated by the Central Pennsylvania Conservancy (CPC). Its lead partner in this venture is Pine Grove Furnace State Park with additional groups who provide support. The camp is hosted at the Ironmaster's Mansion in Pine Grove Furnace (outside of Carlisle). Participants learn key lessons in leadership and citizenship while exploring and

learning about the history and natural resources of the South Mountain landscape. These topics are presented by area teachers, practitioners and community leaders. Appalachian Audubon (AAS) has pledged two scholarships in the amount of \$200 each for this experience and will review the applications selected by CPC to receive them. 
AAS Awards Hog Island Family Camp Scholarship

AAS 2015 ANNUAL APPEAL

Golden-winged C

This year's AAS annual appeal will raise funds for a joint effort to establish "urgently needed high quality" young forest habitat in Pennsylvania for Golden-winged



Warblers and 19 other species of conservation concern, including the Cerulean Warbler. The Golden-winged Warbler Project is a partnership between the American Bird Conservancy, Dr. Jeff Larkin of Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP), and the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy. The project is beginning its second year and has already received private funding from other sources.

The project will partner with 60 landowners to create at least 1,200 acres of young forest habitat that meets the needs of the Golden-winged Warblers Best Management Plan. It will also establish

permanent protection of 2,500 acres of mature forest adjacent to the young forest for foraging habitat for the Golden-winged Warblers and other species of concern.

The Pennsylvania project will serve as a model for other Appalachian and Great Lakes states to protect the Golden-winged Warblers. Funds will also be used to purchase telemetry units for tracking areas visited by the targeted species and for other equipment and expenses of staff working on this project through the IUP-Research Institute.

You are invited to support this important habitat protection project to keep the Golden-winged Warbler and other species of conservation concern off the endangered species list.

Volunteers Gearing Up for Fledge Watch

Volunteers for the Harrisburg Peregrine Falcon Fledge Watch are getting ready for the 2015 fledging season. Three chicks have hatched to the local falcon pair,

situated on the 15th floor ledge of the Rachel Carson State Office Building in downtown Harrisburg. The first hatch occurred on April 21; the third egg hatched two days later. The fourth egg did not hatch.

Weighing about 1.5 ounces at hatching, naked, helpless, and blind, falcon chicks keep their parents busy all day long keeping them safe and warm and providing food for them. Meanwhile the chicks grow at an exponential rate. By three weeks, they are nearly their parents' weight and size, and feathers are beginning to develop. They spend the next three to four weeks growing feathers, exercising their wings and learning how to be falcons by watching their parents.

Sometime near the end of May, the young falcons will take their first leap from the ledge, and the Fledge Watch volunteers will be there. First flights can be clumsy and, on occasion,

dangerous. Inexperienced flyers still need to develop their flight muscles for sustained flight, and they don't yet know how to use their wings for optimal lift. It takes time to learn how to judge an approach for landing. Sometimes new fledglings land on the sidewalk or the street. bump into walls and bruise


their wings or get concussions, or end up in other dangerous situations. When that happens, trained Fledge Watch volunteers rescue the downed birds according to an established protocol.

The rescued fledgling is then examined. If it appears healthy and uninjured it will be released to the roof of the Carson Building, where it can be supervised by its parents until it is ready to try again. If the fledgling is injured or shows signs of illness, it will be taken to Red Creek Wildlife Center for rehabilitation. Red Creek has done wonderful work with many of South Central/South Eastern PA's Peregrine Falcons. In most cases, the young bird can be returned to its parents within a few days. Volunteers will continue to

monitor the fledglings for several days after their first flight, until they are flying safely and independently. At some point after the first few days of flight, we will see it happen – suddenly the fledgling begins to fly with confidence, speeding through the air and performing dazzling feats of aerial acrobatics. It is the moment when the young falcon embraces the sky as its home, and our job is done.

If you have available time between May 29 and June 8 please consider becoming a Fledge Watch volunteer. It is not only rewarding to give a young life another chance at successful flight, but we have a lot of fun during our watches. If you are
